First Lesson: Ruth 1:1-18

In the days when the judges ruled, there was a famine in the land, and a certain man of Bethlehem in Judah went to live in the country of Moab, he and his wife and two sons. The name of the man was Elimelech and the name of his wife Naomi, and the names of his two sons were Mahlon and Chilion; they were Ephrathites from Bethlehem in Judah. They went into the country of Moab and remained there. But Elimelech, the husband of Naomi, died, and she was left with her two sons. These took Moabite wives; the name of the one was Orpah and the name of the other Ruth. When they had lived there about ten years, both Mahlon and Chilion also died, so that the woman was left without her two sons and her husband.

Then she started to return with her daughters-in-law from the country of Moab, for she had heard in the country of Moab that the Lord had considered his people and given them food. So she set out from the place where she had been living, she and her two daughters-in-law, and they went on their way to go back to the land of Judah. But Naomi said to her two daughters-in-law, "Go back each of you to your mother's house. May the Lord deal kindly with you, as you have dealt with the dead and with me. The Lord grant that you may find security, each of you in the

house of your husband." Then she kissed them, and they wept aloud. They said to her, "No, we will return with you to your people." But Naomi said, "Turn back, my daughters, why will you go with me? Do I still have sons in my womb that they may become your husbands? Turn back, my daughters, go your way, for I am too old to have a husband. Even if I thought there was hope for me, even if I should have a husband tonight and bear sons, would you then wait until they were grown? Would you then refrain from marrying? No, my daughters, it has been far more bitter for me than for you, because the hand of the Lord has turned against me." Then they wept aloud again. Orpah kissed her mother-in-law, but Ruth clung to her.

So she said, "See, your sister-in-law has gone back to her people and to her gods; return after your sister-in-law." But Ruth said, "Do not press me to leave you or to turn back from following you! Where you go, I will go; Where you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God my God. Where you die, I will die—there will I be buried. May the Lord do thus and so to me, and more as well, if even death parts me from you!"

When Naomi saw that she was determined to go with her, she said no more to her.

How to use your smartphone to connect to the listening system

We have recently installed *Listen Everywhere* for parishioners who use hearing aids with Bluetooth capabilities. It's easy to use. (Your hearing aids will need to be connected with your smart device via Bluetooth before you start.) For the best experience use your phone in airplane mode so the service doesn't get interrupted by your notifications and phone calls. After you download the *Listen Everywhere* app from your App Store, follow these instructions.



- Use the QR code to download *Listen Everywhere*
- After that downloads go to your Bluetooth settings and choose the "audio" Wi-Fi network
- Enter the password **saeclisten** all small letters
- You will be asked to approve some setting changes and give some permissions
- Go back to *Listen Everywhere* and do a venue scan
- Choose the St. Andrew's channel
- Tap the play button on the channel's image
- And finally, tap the speaker button in the bottom left-hand corner to turn the sound on and adjust the volume on your phone

Icon of the Week

All Saints

All Saints' Day is one of the seven principal feasts of the church year and commemorates all saints, known and unknown, on November 1. The icons for this feast developed from the ninth century onwards and have not varied much. At first the icon was for martyrs, then saints, and then righteous were added to the icon.

This feast expanded, stressing that the number of saints is unlimited. In the lower third of the icon, the center point represents Paradise with its abundance of trees and hills. Abraham, in the lower left corner, carries a boy in white clothing, a symbol of his purity and the souls of the righteous saints. In the corner to the right, Jacob is holding the "Twelve Tribes" in a cloth. In the central part of the icon is the great "cloud of witnesses" mentioned by St. Paul in his letter to the Hebrews (11:33-12:2). The saints are gathered around Christ, who is seated in the middle. Jesus is shown in his pre-eternal glory, with the Father and the Holy Spirit. The Virgin Mary is to the right of Jesus, with St. John the Baptist to his left. They stand in intercession. Four creatures surround the Lord Jesus Christ. They symbolize the four evangelists: Matthew: a humanlike angel (because he spoke on the Son of Man); Mark: a lion, for the fact that his Gospel begins with "a voice of one crying in the wilderness" like the roaring of lions; Luke: the bull for mentioning Zacharias the priest, who made a sacrifice on the altar. This is a symbol of the cross. John: the eagle, who soared into theology, and spoke about Christ in great theological depth.

Above the Lord is the Throne of Preparation before which Adam and Eve prostrate themselves. The Cross is behind them, and the Gospel is set before them on the Holy Table. The saints themselves are gathered into ranks according to their "type": martyrs, ascetics, holy fathers, apostles, and so on. In the top left corner of the icon is King David and King Solomon is in the top right.

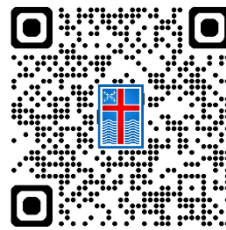

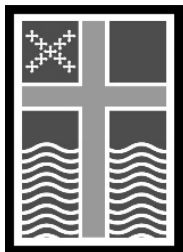
