Icon of the Week

St. John of the Cross

1542-1591

John was born in 1542 at Fontiveros, near Avila, Spain. After his third birthday, his father died leaving his mother and her children reduced to poverty. John received elementary education in an orphanage in Medina del Campo. By the age of 17, he had learned carpentry, tailoring, sculpturing, and painting through apprenticeships to local craftsmen. After university studies with the Jesuits, John entered the Carmelite Order and completed his theological studies in Salamanca. By the age of 35 he had studied extensively, had been spiritual director to many including St. Teresa of Avila, and yet devoted himself to the search for God so fully that he reached the peak of the mystical experience: a complete transformation in God.

St. Teresa recruited St. John to help her crusade to return the order of the Carmelites to a life centered on prayer. Feeling threatened by this reform, The Carmelites of St. John's own order kidnapped him, locked him in a small dark cell, and regularly beat him. During this isolation of cold, and darkness, God gave him illumination and consolation, which St. John expressed in a series of mystical poems written in his cell. After nine months, he miraculously escaped. From then on, his life was devoted to sharing and explaining his experience of God's love. He expresses his journey in the spiritual classic, "The Dark Night of the Soul."

His feast day is December 14

Christmas Eve Services

Tuesday, December 24, (3pm & 5pm will be broadcast)

Children's Service at 3pm

This half-hour service is aimed at young children. We sing carols, hear the Christmas story, and have a children's homily (no Holy Communion). The service is followed by cupcakes.

Family Eucharist at 5pm

This hour-long Holy Communion service is the most well attended Christmas Eve service at St. Andrew's. The service ends with the church darkened and everyone holding a candle as we sing "Silent Night."

Holy Eucharist Choral Service at 10pm

This is a traditional service with communion, carols, a sermon, and choral anthems.

A 20-minute musical prelude precedes the hour-long service with the full choir and a string quartet.

- By mail Please mail by Monday,
 December 16 to allow for holiday mail delays.

For 2025, you can set up automatic payments within *Realm* specifying the amount and frequency as well as a start and end date to have your pledge payments paid and recorded.
