First Lesson: Nehemiah 8:1-3, 5-6, 8-10

All the people of Israel gathered together into the square before the Water Gate. They told the scribe Ezra to bring the book of the law of Moses, which the Lord had given to Israel. Accordingly, the priest Ezra brought the law before the assembly, both men and women and all who could hear with understanding. This was on the first day of the seventh month. He read from it facing the square before the Water Gate from early morning until midday, in the presence of the men and the women and those who could understand; and the ears of all the people were attentive to the book of the law. And Ezra opened the book in the sight of all the people, for he was standing above all the people; and when he opened it, all the people stood up. Then Ezra blessed the Lord, the great God, and

all the people answered, "Amen, Amen," lifting up their hands. Then they bowed their heads and worshiped the Lord with their faces to the ground. So they read from the book, from the law of God, with interpretation. They gave the sense, so that the people understood the reading.

And Nehemiah, who was the governor, and Ezra the priest and scribe, and the Levites who taught the people said to all the people, "This day is holy to the Lord your God; do not mourn or weep." For all the people wept when they heard the words of the law. Then he said to them, "Go your way, eat the fat and drink sweet wine and send portions of them to those for whom nothing is prepared, for this day is holy to our Lord; and do not be grieved, for the joy of the Lord is your strength."

Second Lesson: 1 Corinthians 12:12-31a

Just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body—Jews or Greeks, slaves or free—and we were all made to drink of one Spirit. Indeed, the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot would say, "Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear would say, "Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body," that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would the hearing be? If the whole body were hearing, where would the sense of smell be? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it

is, there are many members, yet one body. The eye cannot say to the hand, "I have no need of you," nor again the head to the feet, "I have no need of you." On the contrary, the members of the body that seem to be weaker are indispensable, and those members of the body that we think less honorable we clothe with greater honor, and our less respectable members are treated with greater respect; whereas our more respectable members do not need this. But God has so arranged the body, giving the greater honor to the inferior member, that there may be no dissension within the body, but the members may have the same care for one another. If one member suffers, all suffer together with it; if one member is honored, all rejoice together with it.

Now you are the body of Christ and individually members of it. And God has appointed in the church first apostles, second prophets, third teachers; then deeds of power, then gifts of healing, forms of assistance, forms of leadership, various kinds of tongues. Are all apostles? Are all prophets? Are all teachers? Do all work miracles? Do all possess gifts of healing? Do all speak in tongues? Do all interpret? But strive for the greater gifts.

Icon of the Week

Holy Trinity

In the story *The Hospitality of Abraham* from the Book of Genesis, Abraham encounters three men who are later revealed to be angels. This icon, based on the famous 1411 icon of the Holy Trinity by Russian iconographer Andrei Rublev, is the first depiction of the Godhead—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—as three distinct persons.

The angels form a circle, inviting us into the center. They are depicted conversing, with smooth and restrained gestures that convey the sub-lime nature of their dialogue. The left angel represents God the Father, with His right hand raised in the gesture of exordium (signifying something important). The central angel represents Christ, with a red and gold stole over His right shoulder, symbolizing royalty and Christ's divine Sonship. The right angel represents the Holy Spirit, with blue robes symbolizing divinity and green representing new life.

The wings of the Father and the Son overlap, while the wings of the Holy Spirit are separated by the Son's spear. The blue color of the Son's robe represents divinity, the brown symbolizes His humanity, and the gold signifies His kingship. The poses and inclinations of the Holy Spirit and the Son's heads reflect their submission to the Father, though their shared placement on the thrones signifies equality. The tree represents the Tree of Life, reminding us of Jesus's death and resurrection, which opened the way to eternal life. The mountain symbolizes the spiritual ascent that humanity achieves with the help of the Holy Spirit.

The unity of the trinity's underlying reality expresses unity and love between all things: That they may all be one just as you, father, or in me, and I in you, that they also may be in us, so that the world may believe that you have sent me. —John 17: 21
