First Lesson: Jeremiah 32:1-3a, 6-15

The word that came to Jeremiah from the Lord in the tenth year of King Zedekiah of Judah, which was the eighteenth year of Nebuchadrezzar. At that time the army of the king of Babylon was besieging Jerusalem, and the prophet Jeremiah was confined in the court of the guard that was in the palace of the king of Judah, where King Zedekiah of Judah had confined him.

Jeremiah said, The word of the Lord came to me: Hanamel son of your uncle Shallum is going to come to you and say, "Buy my field that is at Anathoth, for the right of redemption by purchase is yours." Then my cousin Hanamel came to me in the court of the guard, in accordance with the word of the Lord, and said to me, "Buy my field that is at Anathoth in the land of Benjamin, for the right of possession and redemption is yours; buy it for yourself." Then I knew that this was the word of the Lord. And I bought the field

at Anathoth from my cousin Hanamel, and weighed out the money to him, seventeen shekels of silver. I signed the deed, sealed it, got witnesses, and weighed the money on scales. Then I took the sealed deed of purchase, containing the terms and conditions, and the open copy; and I gave the deed of purchase to Baruch son of Neriah son of Mahseiah, in the presence of my cousin Hanamel, in the presence of the witnesses who signed the deed of purchase, and in the presence of all the Judeans who were sitting in the court of the guard. In their presence I charged Baruch, saying, Thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel: Take these deeds, both this sealed deed of purchase and this open deed, and put them in an earthenware jar, in order that they may last for a long time. For thus says the Lord of hosts, the God of Israel: Houses and fields and vineyards shall again be bought in this land.

Second Lesson: 1 Timothy 6:6-19

There is great gain in godliness combined with contentment; for we brought nothing into the world, so that we can take nothing out of it; but if we have food and clothing, we will be content with these. But those who want to be rich fall into temptation and are trapped by many senseless and harmful desires that plunge people into ruin and destruction. For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil, and in their eagerness to be rich some have wandered away from the faith and pierced themselves with many pains.

But as for you, man of God, shun all this; pursue righteousness, godliness, faith, love, endurance, gentleness. Fight the good fight of the faith; take hold of the eternal life, to which you were called and for which you made the good confession in the presence of many witnesses. In the presence of God, who gives life to all things, and of Christ Jesus, who in his testimony before Pontius Pilate made the good confession, I charge you to keep the commandment without spot or blame until the manifestation of our Lord Jesus Christ,

which he will bring about at the right time—he who is the blessed and only Sovereign, the King of kings and Lord of lords. It is he alone who has immortality and dwells in unapproachable light, whom no one has ever seen or can see; to him be honor and eternal dominion. Amen.

As for those who in the present age are rich, command them not to be haughty, or

to set their hopes on the uncertainty of riches, but rather on God who richly provides us with everything for our enjoyment. They are to do good, to be rich in good works, generous, and ready to share, thus storing up for themselves the treasure of a good foundation for the future, so that they may take hold of the life that really is life.

 - Transept Please wait for usher instructions after the main church has gone forward.
- To receive communion, cup your hands for a wafer. You may drink from the chalice or dip your wafer.
- For a blessing, cross your arms over your chest.
- Afterward, please return to your pew via the side aisles for quiet prayer.

Icon of the Week

St. Michael and All Angels

The scriptural word "angel" (Greek: angelos) means, literally, a messenger. God's messengers can be visible or invisible and may assume human or non-human forms. Christians have always felt themselves to be attended by healthful spirits—swift, powerful, and enlightening. Those beneficent spirits are often depicted in Christian art in human form, with wings to signify their swiftness and spacelessness, with swords to signify their power, and with dazzling raiment to signify their ability to enlighten. Unfortunately, this type of pictorial representation has led many to dismiss angels as "just another mythical beast, like the unicorn, the griffin, or the sphinx." Of the many angels spoken of in the Bible, only four are called by name: Michael, Gabriel, Uriel, and Raphael. The Archangel Michael is the powerful agent of God who wards off evil from God's people and delivers peace to them at the end of this life's mortal struggle. The Archangel is often depicted blowing the trumpet while thrusting the spear into the mouth of the devil. "Michaelmas," as his feast is called in England, has long been one of the popular celebrations of the Christian year. The Michaelmas daisy is a symbol for St. Michael. Just as the daisy fights against the advancing gloom of autumn and winter, St. Michael is celebrated as a protector from darkness and evil.

His feast day is September 29.

Everlasting God, you have ordained and constituted in a wonderful order the ministries of angels and mortals: mercifully grant that, as your holy angels always serve and worship you in heaven, so by your appointment they may help and defend us here on earth; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen

Ministry Fair

Many thanks to all who participated in hosting tables and helping with the ministry fair last Sunday. It was great to see so many people mingling at and visiting all the different ministry tables.

Outreach Grant Recipients

Thanks to those who have submitted grant proposals. Here is a summary of the four awards (\$5k each) approved by the Outreach Committee. We have \$10k remaining, which could fund 2-4 more in 2025 (maximum grant is \$5k).

- **Agassiz Village** (summer camp in Poland, Maine) To restore cabins to accommodate more summer campers from underprivileged families in Maine and the Boston area. (sponsored by our Youth Group).
- **The Wellesley Food Pantry** (sponsored by Susan Kemp) A transportation initiative to enable improved access to WFP by local residents with limited mobility. This is a pilot program, separate from our food support for the WFP.
- Science Training Encouraging Peace (sponsored by Mary Scanlon) A graduate training program aimed at building cooperative professional and personal relationships between pairs of Israeli and Palestinian science scholars, thereby advancing relations between Israeli and Palestinian societies.
- RememberUs.org (sponsored by Julie Koeninger)
 Needham based relief effort's Golden Age project which
 provides vital medicines to elderly populations in war torn
 Ukraine.
